ished at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes." Those gathered in the synagogue where Jesus taught had never heard anything like this before.


"The people were aston-

They were used to the preaching of the well-educated scribes, but Jesus possessed something that those men lacked: authority. Instead of merely interpreting the laws of the prophets, Jesus presented a new vision, indeed, he shared the good news of the Gospel with his listeners.

We do not have the opportunity to stand in the presence of Jesus in the same way that those first-century Jews did, but nonetheless we can also stand in awe of his authority. His teachings are available to us through the sacred Scriptures that the Church has preserved and through the sacred tradition that the Church carries on. And in a special way, Christ's authority continues to inspire and guide us through the ministries of the papacy, episcopacy, and priesthood that Jesus established on our behalf while he was yet on earth.

As Catholics, we have a special share in the astonishing authority of Jesus through the hierarchy of the Church. Although this structure is often misunderstood or misinterpreted, it is actually an authority rooted in service and modeled after Christ who told his apostles, "The greatest among you must be your servant" (Mt 23:11).

This humble exercise of authority is contrary to the worldly search for power. And whenever we find ourselves in a position of authority, we too should strive to lead and direct others in the true spirit of Christian love and service. Chances are, if we truly imitate Christ in this way, people will be astonished at what they see.

St. Matthew's DIA Monet Exhibit Outing and Dinner at The Majestic Café



We are going to the Detroit Institute of Art for the Monet Exhibit, which features the only art work of Monet that is in the DIA 's collection. However, around this painting, "Corbeille de Fleurs," (rounded flower beds) are 11 other Impressionist works all contemporaries of Monet including a Renoir.

This period, during the 1870's, was a decade when Monet and other artists of that time formed an art movement called "Impressionism." This movement rejected the convention of painting in grandiose styles and was revolutionary in its methods.

Along with the exhibit, a dinner is being offered to those attending at The Majestic Café following the tour. Shuttle service to and from the DIA will be available from The Majestic starting at 1:15 pm. Please see the flyer for details on this service.



How to Pull Your Online Giving Statement

- 1. Log in to your Online Giving donor account.
- 2. Click on "View My Giving History & Tax Information ."
- 3. On the right side, click the "Print" button
- 4. Set your date range from 1/1/2017 to 12/31/2017.
- 5. Change the report type to "Full Detail Report (Tax Purposes)."
- 6. Leave the tax filter option checked.
- 7. Click "Print."
- 8. Your report will open a new window.
- 9. You will need to export the report to a PDF to print the full report.

To print, click on the PDF link at the top of the screen. This will open the report as a PDT and will let you print the report. Make sure you have your pop-up blocker is disabled.
