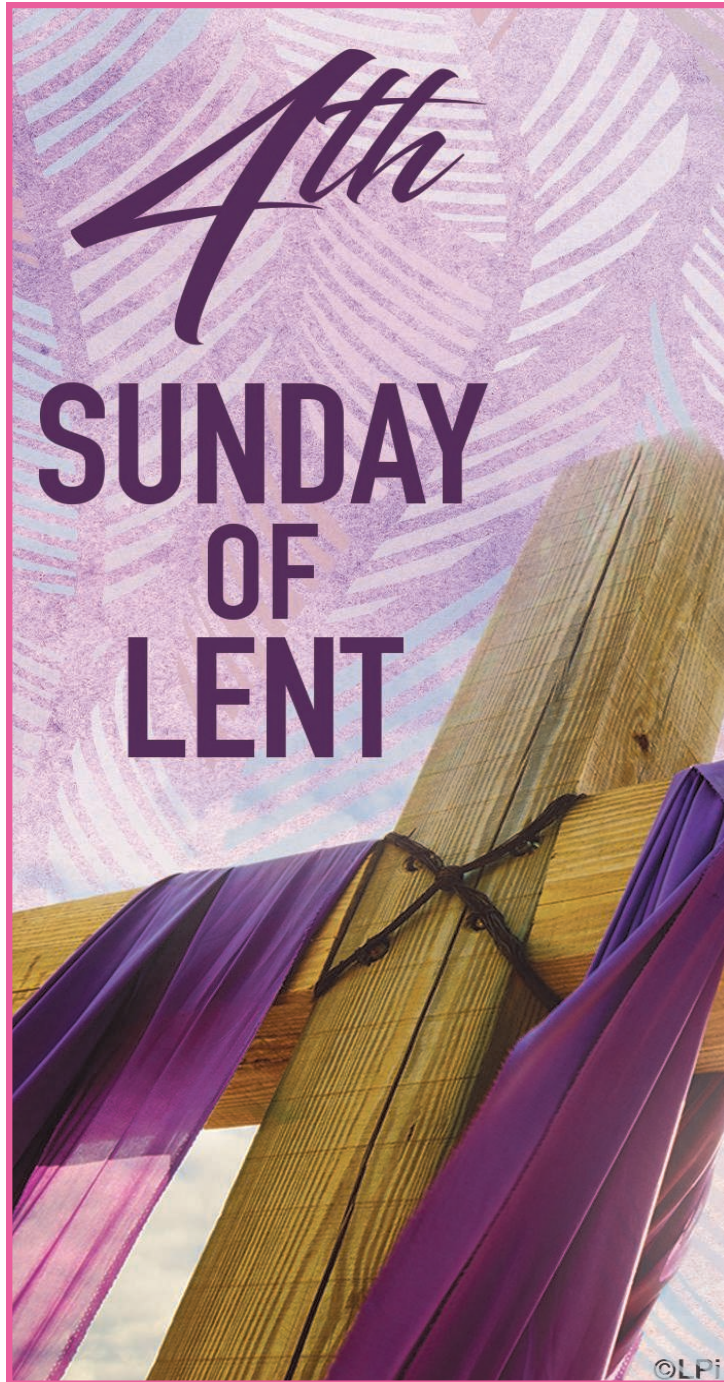

## From Father Duane's Desk

During the season of Lent, we are reflecting on the "joy of the Season." It seems odd to say that, it almost sounds like Christmas. But as we have been reflecting, Lent starts with the wonder of God's love for us. Opening ourselves up to God in prayer, we enter upon a conversion journey deepening our relationship to a merciful God and knowledge of Jesus which is a joyful experience.

But how does fasting fit into this reflection, and how can self-denial, sacrifice, and mortification be joyful? The Latin root of the word *mortification* literally means to put to death. If putting to death bad habits or any action that undermines our humanness, then it is not something sad but full of joy. Oh, it may be difficult to change habits and patterns; but, if it opens up for us a new zest for life and living in the Spirit, then it is a joy.

Let me explain. We are not called to despise our humanness. God created everything good. So to die to self (mortify) is not a denial of the goodness of who we are, but a recognition that self-defeating patterns of behavior diminish our true humanness.

Giving up things, sacrificing, and denying ourselves is not to cause pain, but they are done in pursuit of the fullness of life which God fashions for us out of His love. Looking at Lent in this fashion is not a putting to death but a coming to life.

Fasting is a path to joy because it opens a path to a fuller life. We sacrifice a false or lesser belief for a fuller one gaining a measure of freedom over compulsive behavior.

If you sacrifice an hour away from your computer or "hand-held device" and reflectively used this same amount, would your life be less joyful? If you took that \$20 or \$40 you spent on your favorite indulgence; i.e., alcohol, deserts, junk food and donate it to a worthy cause, would your life be less? If you "put to death" that which has diminished you, a false life for a true self free from a slavery you are caught in, would that not be joyful?

Yes, fasting, although difficult, can offer us the freedom of God's love and mercy. And isn't that a wonderful joy?

### 4th Sunday of Lent

Candles provide a wonderful atmosphere. Their soft glow and warm light soften the colors and give us a sense of comfort. Even in a large room that is illuminated by other lighting, when there are candles around we feel that we are drawn in closer, because the candlelight itself casts just a small

footprint, almost asking us to huddle together. Modern lighting can flood every nook and cranny with a brilliance that surpasses the light of a single candle. But we won't lean in to be close to a light bulb the way we might to a flickering flame. More than a century and a quarter after light bulbs were first introduced in the 1880s, we still use candles for light in some of our most joyous and most intimate moments.

The man born blind in today's Gospel has no experience of light at all. He would have felt the sun's warmth, but known nothing of its brilliance. He likely knew flame, and the heat generated by the fire of a hearth or the burning of an oil lamp. But he had no idea of the glow of illumination shed by these lights. He was completely in the dark. That is what makes his cure all the more amazing. This man has never seen light! Even if we close our eyes for an extended period of time, we can still imagine what something is like, because we have seen it before. This man in the Gospel has never seen!

The light that the man born blind sees is not so much the brilliance of the day, as it is Jesus, the light of the world. Like a room illuminated by electric lights in which candles are burning for atmosphere, the man is drawn to the light that gives him comfort and solace, that is Jesus. The man's single-hearted gaze on Christ is a reminder to us not to be distracted by other lights.

We cannot travel into the darkness without a source of light. Those going through the Second Scrutiny, our Elect, Keith Arcicovich and Cory Fullilove, have come seeking light instead of darkness. When Jesus heals the blind man, he not only gives to him a physical sight that is real, but he also provides for him a new spiritual lens through which he can see the world.



Those who witness the healing, those who then encounter the man, and even those who maintain a cynicism toward him, all have been offered this new way of seeing the world. Those of us who have been baptized have this gift of new sight, but too often we either choose to put on glasses of sin or despair or act like we cannot see that which exists clearly in front of us. We pray for those who will be baptized at Easter to be freed from their darkness, while we oftentimes choose to live with our eyes closed. As we listen to the words of Jesus in the Gospel proclaiming he is the Light of the World, let us resolve to allow God to provide a light for our path so that we may share the good news of this Light with all around us.

Let us pray for them as they look forward to the Easter Vigil.

### God of the Journey, We Encounter You in Teachers Journey to Haiti

"Education is the foundation of everything," says Andrise, who's been teaching at the same elementary school she graduated from in northern Haiti for 11 years.

A lot has changed since she was a student. So CRS has partnered with the Catholic Education Commission to provide new teaching techniques and resources for students. "We use poems, dances, songs, all sorts of activities to help the students improve their literacy," Andrise says. And unlike before, every student have books of their own.

The students love it, and Andrise. She was named Teacher of the Year at her school. "They call me 'my mother,' and I call them 'my son, my daughter,'" she says. "They've already promised that next year, when they're in second grade, they'll take time out of their recess to come and visit."
