

From Father Duane's Desk

Continuing my Lenten Reflections on the Joy of the Lenten Season, I want on this Fifth Sunday of Lent to reflect on finding joy in almsgiving. Charitable giving in the Old Testament Scriptures was usually tied to sacrifice and a tithe was recommended; i.e. 10%. Our Catholic church historically

has not been linked to tithing (as some denominations are), but rather to free-will offering. Our Sunday collections are freewill offerings. We don't tell you what you have to give rather to give what you honestly are able.

I know in my own life when I look at what I contribute to the Church, contribute to favorite charities that are dear to me, along with additional requests that are made, I am surprised that my charitable giving comes to 10% of my income. I'm sure that you probably have the same experience.

But one thing I do know is that in almsgiving, I never act alone. I truly feel as if God is walking with me in my almsgiving.

Isaiah, the prophet, wrote of releasing those bound unjustly, setting free the oppressed, sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, and not turning our back on your own (*Is* 58:6-7).

Fulfilling these needs certainly sounds like the Corporal Works of Mercy. In a real world with real needs that often means for us to contribute to the support of structures and organizations that deal directly with the poor and the downtrodden.

Each of us has to be realistic about what we can give in light of our responsibilities and personal resources. Our time, energy, and finances are not limitless, but stretching ourselves to the point of sacrifice is a way to touch the presence of Christ himself who sacrificed his life for us. In fact, we grow in stature, meaning, and riches when we give joyfully from the heart. Love is not diminished when it is shared, but multiplied.

The joy of almsgiving is sharing in the sacrifice of Christ Jesus who gave his life for all. Charity/almsgiving reflects a deeper spirituality in the believer. Supported by prayer, it aligns us with the Corporal Works of Mercy and demonstrates that we mean what we say. The wonder and joy of giving is truly a Christian action of love, and love is joyful.

As St. Theresa of Lisieux said, "I found happiness the day I forgot myself and began to serve others." These reflections on the Joy of Lent through the disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving bring us ever closer to the Joy of Easter, being one with a new life in Christ is certainly a joyful experience.

I also want to remind you of our Communal Penance Service Monday, March 26, at 7 p.m. God's mercy and love celebrated through the Sacrament of Confession and Reconciliation is the perfect way to prepare ourselves for the Easter Triduum.

5th Sunday of Lent

"Now there were some Greeks among those who had come to worship at the feast. They came to Philip and asked him, 'Sir, we would like to see Jesus."" It has begun. News of Jesus has spread beyond nativeborn, Aramaic-speaking Jews. We don't know if the Greeks



mentioned here heard of Jesus from fellow travelers or if news of this intriguing rabbi had reached all the way to their home. What we do know is that this interaction spurred an interesting comment from Jesus: "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." In other words, it has begun. The time has come for the message to move beyond the geographic bounds of Israel. But what does this message require? The Gospel is clear: "he said this indicating the kind of death he would die." A grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies to its life as only a seed. A caterpillar takes on the appearance of temporary death in order to transform into a butterfly. In the Gospels, sacrifice and death are a way of becoming something more than you were before. This Lent, new life can come from our sacrifices. When we enter into the season with Jesus, our difficulties can transform our perspective. "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."

As we abstain from meat and fast from eating between meals, we can grow in compassion for the hungry. We can give alms of our time, sacrificially spending time with the lonely, the sick, and the marginalized. Our little Lenten "deaths" -- death to unnecessary preferences, death to selfish living, death to ignorance of other's pain -- can bring new life to the world long after the season is over. This is the invitation this Sunday and every Lenten season, to begin anew from death to life.



The words of the hymn, "I Now Live," echo faintly in churches still decorated for Lent as the Third Scrutiny takes place and those who journey toward Easter hear about the raising of Lazarus. The Gospel story is about more than just the raising of a single man, but about the life that Jesus Christ offers to every one of us. But there are many powers that seek to steal this life from us.



In the words of this Scrutiny we pray for those journeying toward Easter, as the presider says: "Free from the grasp of death those who await your life-giving sacraments and deliver them from the spirit of corruption." It is through the sacrament of the Church that Jesus Christ instituted that we receive a new life, but sin stands in our way. But what Jesus did for his friend in this story, he did for us through his cross and resurrection. If we choose life, there is no spirit that can stand against us. May we stand with those before us who will be baptized at Easter and testify to the reality that we now live because we have died and risen with him and death's power is no more.

Our catechumens are looking forward to the celebration of the Easter Sacraments at our Easter Vigil. Let us keep them close to our hearts as they enter into final, intense preparation for the sacraments.

Let us pray.

Good and forgiving God, The Easter Sacraments are drawing near and your children who are preparing for Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist confess their faith in you. Help them to strive against worldly desires and rescue them from ignorance of you. Give us courage to walk with them as they approach your altar for the first time and receive you in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Help us to be models of Christian life for them

and welcome them to the Mystical Body of Christ. We ask all this in your name, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

God of the Journey, We Encounter You in Farmers Journey to Malawi

Alefa is a mother, grandmother, and a farmer. She provides for her three children, three grandchildren, and husband by selling what she grows. If her crops fail during one of Malawi's rainy seasons or in a drought, her family goes hungry.

Knowing she had to start planting crops that could withstand Malawi's changing climate, she attended a CRSsponsored seed fair, where farmers gather to learn the best crops to plant for the upcoming year. Besides rice, Alefa bought corn, cabbage, and tomato seeds. Now she can continue earning money as one of the few rice farmers in her village, but also feels confident that, even if her rice fails, she will have other crops to sell.

"This harvest will provide food, shelter, and education for my family," she says. In a few short months, Alefa will be growing corn and harvesting hope.

Nutritious food is vital to a dignified life. If none is available, families may be forced to migrate.

Let Us Pray

For Alefa and her family in Malawi, who we encounter through CRS Rice Bowl, that the seeds she plants today may also sprout hope and grow opportunity. We pray to the Lord


