24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

We know the signs of defeat: slumped shoulders, downcast eyes, a chastened demeanor. For those of us sincerely trying to follow Jesus, defeat is inevitable. We commit to spending more time with our kids, but that one


project still looms. We resolve to be a good person, but our selfishness strikes again. It can be easy to get discouraged over our moral failures. Today's Gospel is a small, intriguing look at this process in the life of St. Peter.

First, Jesus' questions get the Apostles thinking about his true identity. This results in a confession of faith from Peter: "You are the Christ." Eager faith characterizes Peter's relationship with Jesus. First to follow, first to leap out of the boat, and, we know, first to deny. It's the latter tendency that manifests itself later in the Gospel. When Jesus predicts the Passion, "Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him." Jesus' rebuke in turn is stinging.

While Peter's caution to Jesus is in private, Jesus intentionally turns back to the others as he declares, "Get behind me, Satan. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do."

Like Peter, we rarely get it right all the time. Peter understood that Jesus was the Messiah, but he had a false concept of what that Messiah would accomplish. Jesus wants to make sure the rest of the disciples don't follow down the wrong road. The Christian life is a difficult one, as Jesus later tells the crowds.

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself." Yet the mercy of God is abundant. If we renew our trust and our efforts after a fall, every defeat is transformed into redemptive grace. "Whoever loses his life for my sake, will save it."

If we want to be happy at home, we must commit ("lose ourselves") to our family. If we try to be independent from others ("save ourselves"), we end up lonely and alone. Happiness is found in commitments. The Gospel is true: We save our life by losing it!

St. Matthew, Apostle And Evangelist Feast Day, September 21st

Among the early followers and apostles of Jesus, Matthew is mentioned in the gospels as a publican who, while sitting at the "receipt of custom" in Capernaum, was called to follow Jesus. Matthew was a 1st Century Galilean (presumably born in Galilee), the son of Alpheus. As a tax collector,



he would have been literate in Aramaic and Greek. His fellow Jews would have despised him for what was seen as collaborating with the Roman occupation force.

After his call, Matthew invited Jesus home for a feast. On seeing this, the Scribes and the Pharisees criticized Jesus for eating with tax collectors and sinners. This prompted Jesus to answer, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." (Mark 2:17, Luke 5:32)


Through Matthew's Gospel, we know of the many doings of Christ and the message Christ spread of salvation for all people who come to God through Him. The Gospel account of Matthew tells the same story as that found in the other three Gospels, so scholars are certain of its authenticity. His book is the first of the four Gospels in the New Testament.

It was many years following the death of Christ that Matthew wrote his Gospel account, around 41 and 50 AD. He wrote the book in Aramaic in the hope that his account would convince his fellow people that Jesus was the Messiah and that His kingdom had been fulfilled in a spiritual way. This was an important message at the time when almost everyone was expecting the return of a militant messiah brandishing a sword.

It is believed that he departed for other lands (perhaps with St. Thomas) to escape persecution sometime after 41 AD, possibly Parthia, Persia, or Ethiopia. We do not know how died, whether a natural death or martyrdom.

St. Matthew is often depicted with one of the four living creatures of Revelation 4:7 which reads, "The first living creature was a like lion, the second like a bull, the third living creature had a human face, and the fourth living creature was a flying eagle." St. Matthew's symbol is an angel (the human face). His relics were supposedly discovered in Salerno in 1080. As a tax collector, he is the patron of bankers.

O Glorious St. Matthew, in your Gospel You portray Jesus as the longed-for Messiah who fulfilled the Prophets of the Old Covenant and as the new Lawgiver who founded a Church of the New Covenant. Obtain for us the grace to see Jesus living in his Church and to follow his teachings in our lives on earth so that we may live forever with him in heaven.
