

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

In 1 Samuel, God advises the prophet Samuel not to observe as men see but as God sees. He tells him to "look to the heart." This is the movement of this Sunday's Gospel reading.

"Beware the scribes," Jesus advises. He points out their public greetings and "seats of honor," which stands in sharp contrast to their private greed. For the Jewish people of Jesus' day, honor resides at the top. Power and prestige created a high profile back then as it still does today. After his warning, Jesus turns his disciples' attention elsewhere: a poor widow.

"She, from her poverty, has contributed all she had." While the scribes donated large sums to the temple, they did so "from their surplus wealth." This woman -- in her faith and devotion -- offers "her whole livelihood." Jesus invited his disciples to see with God's eyes, to recognize a holy life in people the world overlooks. Here -- in the poor, the vulnerable, the marginalized -- God waits hidden.

Today's Gospel begs a few questions. What do we see? Whom do we value? Are we impressed by the pomp and circumstance of modern day Pharisees? Do we ignore their self-righteousness because it looks impressive, even seems somewhat helpful? The point isn't to judge the scribes, of course. God can see their hearts as well, and those assessments are firmly his responsibility. The point is to turn our eyes from the typically honored to the rarely respected. Are we disinterested in the poverty of the modern day widows? Do we ignore their faith because we forget to look for it? This Sunday, consider the widows in your own life. Who can you see with God's eyes?

Pastoral Notes on Christian Burial

(Excerpts from Correspondence by Archbishop Allen Vigernon, October 2018)

An act of mercy and an act of faith: with these two foundational assertions, Pope Francis summarized a Christian's approach to burial. The Holy Father's remark was his reflection on the corporal works of mercy. "It is my burning desire that the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. It will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty."

Among these works of mercy the Holy Father hoped to "reawaken our conscience" is the call to bury the dead. There has been a shift in societal expectations toward funerals, and regrettably this has begun to influence the Catholic faithful. Swayed by materialistic and an overly practical approach to life, many have seen this noble act of mercy as an unnecessary luxury or an inconvenience. Five years ago, I wrote a letter addressing this issue (available on request to the rectory), and since that time two important developments have occurred in the life of the local Church concerning Christian burial that need to be shared.

The first "Unleash the Gospel" initiative, which through homilies and prayers, the news of a risen Christ is our mission to proclaim. We believe in the Resurrection of the dead and the communion of saints. The funeral vigil, the Eucharistic celebration, the committal (burial or internment) evangelizes us, sharing the good news that God is near, even in our sorrow, difficulties, and distress. Through these liturgies, we proclaim to the faithful or those with little faith that our loved ones are not memories but alive in eternity

The second development is more concrete in that our Catholic Funeral and Cemetery Services has begun an initiative called "Gather Them Home" which has developed over the past few decades. It has been fairly common for Catholics to choose, either for themselves or those they love, to have their bodies cremated upon passing from this life. Ordinarily the Church hopes to be able to celebrate the funeral liturgy with the body present; however, cremation is permitted when circumstances justify it. Lately it has become increasingly common for the remains of loved ones to be kept in the home after the funeral liturgy. Many reasons exist for this; i.e., to be close to the deceased loved one, lack of financial resources for proper burial, inability to arrange (continued on Page Three)

for a committal while family is in town. This is not to critique the reasons but to offer an opportunity to reverently place these sacred remains in a sacred place.

This November, All Souls' Month, our archdiocesan Catholic cemeteries (Holy Sepulchre, Our Lady of Hope, St. Joseph, Mt. Carmel, Holy Cross, and Mt. Hope) will offer the opportunity for the remains of loved ones who have passed away to be entrusted to their final resting place. The initiative started on November 2 and will continue on the third Friday of each month at Holy Sepulchre and Our Lady of Hope Cemeteries. More information about this opportunity, including details on how to participate, will be communicated in the coming weeks.

It is the conviction of the church that the earthly remains of our loved ones in Christ deserve to be properly committed to a sacred place. Perhaps you can gently share this opportunity with someone you know. Our cemeteries are extensions of our parishes; places for prayer, reflection, hope, and remembrance. From these sacred places, those buried will rise on the Last Day.

May the Holy Spirit deepen our conviction that Christ is risen and give us the courage to live in joyful witness that we have risen with him. Entrusting you to the intercession of St. Joseph of Arimathea, I remain sincerely yours in Christ,


