

#### 4th Sunday of Advent

Here we are, mere days from Christmas, and we hear a Gospel anticipating the birth of another child. Mary has received word that her cousin Elizabeth is with child. Pregnant as she is, Mary "set out and traveled to

the hill country in haste." She has recently received the greatest news of her life - that she is to be mother to the Messiah by the power of the Holy Spirit - but her concern is for her cousin in need. Through God's grace, Elizabeth turns it into an opportunity to honor the coming Christ. "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb." Yet Mary's example of selflessness should inspire us.

As Christmas draws near, there is plenty of goodness to anticipate for many of us. We'll reunite with family and friends, uphold time-honored traditions, swap stories old and new, exchange gifts, and welcome Jesus at the Christmas liturgy. These are wonderful things! Of course, they probably all come with their own to-do list. Shop for last-minute gifts, pick up recipe ingredients, ready the guest room, or pack your own bags. Mary probably had things to do as well. She had a lot to consider, for one thing. How do you plan to tell your parents you're pregnant, but no man was involved? When Joseph finds out, who will care for the practical needs of you and your child? Into what may have been a chaos of questions, Mary receives news that someone is in need. She goes immediately.

In these final days before Christmas, stay watchful and awake! You never know when God might invite you to welcome, hospitality, and compassion. It might be tempting to reject the opportunity for your own needs. Follow the example of Mary! If God is providing you an opportunity to love, He will provide the means to accomplish all your other tasks. This Christmas season, may you too hear, "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."




#### A Surprise Gift

"God's love has been poured into our hearts through The Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Romans 5:5)

On this Sunday just before Christmas, we listen to the Gospel of the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. Mary shows us that being comes before doing, and to leave the doing to God in order to be truly as God wants us. It is God who works so many marvels in us. Mary is receptive, but not passive. Because, on the physical level, she receives the power of the Holy Spirit and then gives flesh and blood to the Son of God who forms within her.

Thus, on the spiritual level, she accepts the grace and corresponds to it with faith. As Mary was greeted by Elizabeth as "blessed among women," so too we have always been "blessed," that is, loved. Regarding this love, regarding this mercy, the divine grace poured into our hearts, one single thing is asked in return: unreserved giving. Not one of us can buy salvation! Salvation is a free gift of the Lord, a free gift of God that comes within us and dwells in us. As we have received freely, so are we called to give freely; imitating Mary, who, immediately upon receiving the Angel's announcement, went to share the gift of her fruitfulness with her relative, Elizabeth. In visiting her, the Virgin Mary brought not only material help but she also brought Jesus, who was already alive in her womb. (Pope Francis)



### Fourth Week of Advent Prayer

The father of the household or the designated leader for the group lights all four candles in proper sequence during the fourth week after saying the following prayer.

O Lord, stir up Your power, we pray You and come; and with great might help us that with the help of Your grace, Your merciful forgiveness may hasten what our sins impede. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Candles can be replaced as necessary during the Advent Season without re-blessing the wreath. Replace the purple/ pink candles with white candles for the Christmas Season.


### The Giving Tree



#### Priest iTunes Scam Ramps up for the Holidays

A number of reports in our Archdiocese have come in lately of an iTunes scam where e-mails are being sent to parishioners impersonating a priest, often their own pastor. The e-mails typically come from an "@gmail.com" address and are not from the actual pastor. The impersonator asks the individual to purchase iTunes cards for someone in need, and will engage in an e-mail dialogue ultimately asking to have the person scratch off the pin code from the purchased iTunes cards and e-mail a picture of it so they can misuse the money.

This has been a nation-wide scam reported across many dioceses, and there is no obvious pattern that points to a specific system breach. With just an e-mail, a bad actor can find a lot information about a person,, who they are, where they worship, and who they know. Presume any request for iTunes cards or other unusual purchase from a priest is fake. Be sure to verify any request from an unexpected e-mail or phone call by calling or emailing through a separate, known and official channel.
