sion of the Gospel as best we can and desire to one day inherit the surprise of life eternal God promises to us. We are not trail blazers. We are simple people who want to do the simple things of life well. But there are others who left a more profound impact along the way of the paths they walked. Folks like Dorothy Day, Martin Luther King, Thomas Merton, Gandhi, St. Teresa of Calcutta, and many others left lasting impacts and legacies. Like Moses, they show us by word and deed who God is and what integrity and a purpose driven life look like. They show us how to be holy. We need Moses people like these to give us inspiration, hope and an example of

holy living. We do not need to do what they did or even mirror their relationship with God. Each one of us is God's special creation, with a purpose and soul known only to us. We need to learn how to open up and bring, without compromise, our soul -ness to life. We know when someone is authentic and centered because they always point to truth, even though they struggle and sin themselves, and they embody an unspoken timeless wisdom that just sounds and feels right. Jesus taught with this same type of authority and it astonished many who listened. We do not need to move mountains, advance a cause, write books or become notable. All we have to do is become credible witnesses of the faith we profess. Moses people can teach us how to do this.

St. Oscar Romero was an amazing man and a Moses figure for sure. He saw God in the burning bush and brought the flame of Gospel faith to the poorest of the poor, challenging the evils of the society in which he lived. He was tireless and persistent. He must have gotten very close to the problem because it cost him his life. He suspected it would. St. Romero said, "When we leave Mass, we ought to go out the way Moses descended Mt Sinai: with his face shining, with his heart brave and strong to face the world's difficulties." We can learn from this wisdom. If we allow the power of the Mass to truly transform us, we will leave that holy encounter changed. Our face will shine, and we will have courage. We can then bring what we have received to life's challenges. That sounds doable, doesn't it? Because of the example of our simple holiness, people will be amazed.



The tree is down and you no longer hear Mariah Carey's 'All I Want for Christmas is You' every time you visit the supermarket, so you may have thought the festivities were over. That's right, the candle hasn't gone out on Christmas cheer - in fact, it will be reignited on 2 February for Candlemas.

What is the origin of candles as a religious symbol?

Candles and Candlemas may date back to pagan times much like many other traditions now adopted into the Christian faith. Pagans used to light candles on the day between the winter and spring equinox (the beginning of Spring), as a Festival of Light. Some believed that the weather on this day would determine the weather for the rest of the winter - some may know the traditional rhyme:

> "If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter will have another fight. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, Winter won't come again."

Superstitions included theories that a candle dripping on one side as it enters the church on Candlemas could indicate a death of a family member in the year ahead Snowdrops brought into the house on Candlemas were also thought to serve as a warning of a parting of relationships in the near future.

Why do Christians celebrate Candlemas?

Candlemas is the celebration of the purification of the Virgin Mary 40 days after she gave birth to the Savior, Jesus Christ. It is also an acknowledgment of the day Jesus was presented to God at the Temple in Jerusalem.

In the Gospel of Luke, it is told how Jesus was brought to the Temple by his mother 40 days after he was born. Here, they were met by Anna and Simeon. Simeon lifted Jesus up and called him the Light to the World. Simeon was meant to be the God-receiver, while Anna has become known as a prophetess. The purification of Mary took place this day.

Purification is an old Jewish tradition stemming back to a time when women were considered 'unclean' after the birth of their child. For 40 days after the birth of a boy and 60 days after a girl, a mother was not allowed to enter the Temple and could not worship. Following this period, a purification would take place, and she would be entitled to worship again.

The Christian Church adopted this day, following the purification of the Virgin Mary to bless all of the candles, and so now people tend to light candles on February 2. It was the tradition that Christians would bring their candles to the local parish on this day to be blessed, and these candles would then be used for the rest of the year.
